Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey, is the only university in New Jersey that offers a bachelor's degree in Jewish Studies. During its brief history, the department has grown significantly and enrollment in Jewish Studies courses exceeds 1,500 annually. The Department of Jewish Studies at Rutgers offers an examination of all aspects of the Jewish experience from an interdisciplinary perspective. Courses offered by the department, which are open to all students, address the historical, social, cultural, religious and political life of Jews in the modern period and throughout the ages. The department draws on resources of the Allen and Joan Bildner Center for the Study of Jewish Life.

Each year, Jewish studies majors and minors are invited to apply for competitive awards granted to those who have distinguished themselves in the field of Jewish studies. This year, two additional awards have been established at the Bildner Center solely for the purpose of study in Israel. All full-time undergraduates at Rutgers are eligible to apply for these two awards, which are distributed through the Jewish studies department.

Eighteen Rutgers students, majoring and minoring in Jewish studies, were recognized at an awards ceremony May 3 for their academic achievements. The winners were:



Eileen Caplan Seaman, the school's first president, was originally a trustee of the Hebrew Academy of Perth Amboy. There, she realized Jewish education required a school closer to the Jewish younger population. Seaman approached several synagogues and public schools, searching for an appropriate location. East Brunswick Jewish Center shared her vision for a local Jewish day school, and the East Brunswick Board of Education also provided assistance. Solomon Schechter Day School of Raritan Valley opened its doors in 1981 with 98 students enrolled in pre-K through grade 6. It was, at the time, the largest opening enrollment and highest number of grades for a Solomon Schechter Day School. Seaman grew up in Cleveland and came to the New York metropolitan area as a student at New York University. She and her husband, Allen, now live in Greenwich, Conn., where Seaman runs her law practice.

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
