Reconciling Judaism and Feminism in Contemporary Israeli Art: Lecture to Kick-off Exciting Fall Public Programs at Rutgers' Bildner Center

NEW BRUNSWICK/PISCATAWAY, N.J. – Professor Paula Birnbaum (University of San Francisco), an expert on the impact of gender and ethnicity on contemporary women artists, will explore the intersection of current Israeli art and Jewish religious tradition at this year's Ruth and Alvin Rockoff Annual Program on September 23. The lecture is the first of numerous public programs this fall sponsored by the Bildner Center, including the Rutgers Jewish Film Festival (Oct. 30 – Nov. 11), and talks on Kabbalah and Hebrew literature. Birnbaum is the director of the Art History and Arts Management program at the University of San Francisco, where she is also developing a new M.A. program in Museum Studies. Her recent publications include two books: *Women Artists in Interwar France: Framing Femininities* (Ashgate, 2011), and a coedited anthology, with Anna Novakov, *Essays on Women's Artistic and Cultural Contributions 1919-1939* (Edwin Mellen, 2009).
