RUTGERS' BILDNER CENTER LECTURE EXPLORES ISRAELI FOREIGN POLICY TOWARD WEST GERMANY IN THE 1950s

NEW BRUNSWICK/PISCATAWAY, N.J. – During the 1950s, when the newly established state of Israel had to develop its foreign policy, the case of West Germany presented a particular difficulty. Roni Stauber, the Aresty Visiting Scholar at the Allen and Joan Bildner Center for the Study of Jewish Life, will deliver a lecture on the challenges faced by Israel's leadership at the time as they negotiated between the need to cultivate foreign relations and the raw memory of the Holocaust and its traumatic legacy.

"Memory and Diplomacy: Israeli Diplomats in West Germany in the 1950s" will take place Monday, November 19 at 7:30 p.m., in Trayes Hall, Douglass College Center, 100 George Street, New Brunswick.
